### APPALACHIAN REGIONAL COMMISSION GRANT

The Appalachian Studies Conference has received a grant from the ARC for the 1980 conference. This grant will enable the ASC to offer financial assistance to certain college students who wish to attend the conference in March 1980. Since funds for this purpose are limited, the \$15 student stipends will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis to students who pre-register for the Appalachian Studies Conference. The stipends will help to defray the cost of conference registration and meals.

Students who desire to apply for this financial assistance should complete a conference pre-registration form immediately and should sent it -- with payment -- to Dr. Richard Kesner, Archives of Appalachia, East Tennessee State University, Johnson City, TN 37601. They should indicate their student status on the pre-registration form. Within the limitations of available funds, the \$15 student stipends will be issued shortly after the Appalachian Studies Conference is held. Every attempt will be made to achieve good geographic distribution in the awarding of student stipends.

The pre-registration deadline has been extended to March 12, 1980 in order to accommodate interested students. It will be possible for students to bring sleeping bags and to sleep in Memorial Gymnasium at no cost if they will make their intention known to Dr. Kesner. Other lodging possibilities are listed on the enclosure sent with your registration packet.

Please help us to "spread the word" about the student stipends by alerting interested faculty and students to their availability. The Program Committee would particularly like to provide financial assistance to students who are pursuing a major or minor in Appalachian Studies.

The grant will also be used to underwrite the publication of the Conference Proceedings, to assist in publicizing the conference, and to pay in part for the Road Company production of <a href="Horsepower">Horsepower</a>.
