

1987 AUGUSTA WORKSHOPS AT DAVIS AND ELKINS COLLEGE July 12 - August 16, 1987



CIVIL WAR LIVING HISTORY ENCAMPMENT Appalachian State University June 13-14, 1987






See Confederate soldiers and Federal soldiers drilling, cannon fire, camp life, and a church service on Sunday.


