Anthropology 4120: Appalachian Culture Anthropology 5120: Appalachian Culture and Social Organization

This course will explore a variety of texts in the realm of "community studies" of Appalachia for content, context, research methods, and theory. Community studies and ethnographies provide much of the substance on which scholars and poets alike build their portraits of Appalachia, define and analyze problems, and set a variety of agendas. We will look in detail at some ethnographies (e.g. the professor's!) and cruise through others for major themes.
